



English Literature or English VII and VIII are offered to those wishing to complete their high school study of English in preparation for college. This course is given to acquaint the students with the style and works of the great English writers.

Languages

The dead language, Latin, proves to be a very lively subject to some. Through the translation of the text's many stories, the pupil is able to go back through the centuries to the time of the Caesars' reign. Building step by step, declension upon declension, and conjugation by congugation, the student is able to march with Hannibal across the Alps and fight battles with the mighty Roman army. The highlight of the year is the second-year Latin students' Roman banquet complete with slaves, the well-trained first-year students; and free flowing wine, a mixture of Kool-Aid and grape pop. This is an eagerly anticipated event occurring on the Ides of March, commemorating Caesar's treacherous death.

Spanish has become a popular language and much in demand of the usual high school student. The opportunity to complete two years of this language makes available to the average student the chance to master a language usable in the modern world. Featured in this course is the Spanish Christmas Party including pintas and South of the Border Carols.

oratories, many students are able to delve into the mysteries of the sciences. Chemistry is offered to those wishing to broaden their horizons in the chemical world. This course could well be the start of a career in a laboratory, which is now such an essential factor in this country.

Biology, the science of plants and animals, is offered to those interested in medicine, nursing, forestry and other such related occupations. By use of labs and microscopes, the students are able to understand better the living things surrounding them.

Mathematics, one of the three R's, is stressed at CHS. The courses offered are General Math, Business Math, Algebra I, II, III, and IV; Geometry I and II; Solid Geometry, and Trigonometry.

Offered in the business field are typing, shorthand, bookkeeping. Through use of the model office the students are able to become accustomed to their occupational surroundings. The business students put on a demonstration every year.

Going back to the Roundtable of King Arthur can be most entertaining and educational when you go via Miss Goldsberry's World History class. This is a complete coverage of the world's history in sections of the globe. East, Middle East, and West are brought up to date through use of text books, library

book reports, movies, film-strips, and records. The bulletin boards are usually filled with the students' contributions in the way of art. Clay figures and richly dressed dolls made and clothed by World History classes make fine displays in the Hall showcases.

American History, a class of free speech and enterprise,

Erma Bonds can be and is enjoyed by almost every student in CHS. History class time is filled with movies, filmstrips, records, readings and reports. Through the use of movies and filmstrips the student is able to see in action the people and events that have such a great bearing on his life. The records made avail-

able by the school help to supplement the textbooks used. In general Science, the pupil delves into the mysteries of nature through the aid of textbook, movies, filmstrips, slides and drawings. Studying and learning the secrets of the universe is made available to every student interested.

A well-rounded program of physical training is provided





in CHS as the pupils, unless excused, are required to attend P.T. classes each day. A broad program gives the boys and girls training from routine exercises to complicated games, dancing, tumbling and intramural tournaments.

In the competitive sports of football, basketball, track, and golf the Centerville teams vie with other schools in the South Central conference. In basketball both the Big Reds and the Redettes have gone in recent years to the state tournament—the Redettes being state champions on two occasions.

For the underclassmen the department provides competition with comparable teams from other schools.

Equal emphasis is placed on the extra-curricular music. The vocal and instrumental sections provide ample opportunity for mass participation as well as providing opportunities for the soloists and the small group artists.

Fall and spring concerts are given for the public's benefit. Many civic organizations frequently call on the smaller groups for entertainment purposes. This gives the participants poise, practice and self-confidence.

In the spring the contests consume a major portion of the musician's time. An outstanding record has been compiled during the past years with both small and large groups returning with a lion's share of first place ratings.

Another form of self-expression is in the field of art. Evidence of what the art pupils can do is displayed in the trophy cases and in the store windows in downtown Centerville.

Numerous organizations such as the Latham Foundation offer the pupils the chance to have their efforts judged.

For the vocational-minded pupil CHS offers many outstanding shop courses. The pupil may display his talents in the beginning and advanced woodworking courses. At various times the woodworkers are called upon to effect various stage

props for the drama department. They also have had a hand in the construction of some major projects such as the guidance cabinet located in the well-equipped library.

Just across the hall from the manual training room is located the mechanical drawing room. This department offers a twoyear course in the art of drawing blueprints. CHS is also proud of the fact that they can offer a course in radio and electricity to its pupils.

For the many rural pupils attending Centerville High a complete vocational agriculture course is offered. Pupils in this department take an active interest in the FFA Club. Each year the voc. ag. pupils concentrate on a particular project—this year's being construction of major units such as wagons, hog houses, and large feeders.

The FHA, counterpart of the FFA, is also very active. The girls have attended the district and state meetings with large representations. The local chapter is under excellent supervision and conducts a very complete program the year 'round.

Many girls benefit from the home economics classes in preparing for the years after graduation. The many dresses, pajamas, blouses, skirts, and other projects are displayed in the trophy case and in the downtown show windows.

A new form of education was installed in the Centerville schools two years ago. This special education has given many handicapped pupils a new lease on life. Some of the lesser problems as hearing and sight have been brought to light and have lightened the burden of the pupil, thus enabling him to assume a normal role among the some 467 pupils enrolled in CHS.

And last but not least the guiding hands of the administrators have played an important role in correlating the entire program.

Mr. Fannon in keeping a watchful eye upon the high school program has extended a guiding hand on many occasions.

As the chief's right hand man, principal Carl Miles has played a tremendous role in coordinating the high school program.

Truly CHS has provided an outstanding faculty to guide the future citizens of Centerville, Iowa.


Big Reds Resume










On Sunday, May 25, the seniors listened to the serious thoughts emitted at the baccalaureate service.
