


FOREWORD






Seniors Close With a Profitable Year









Again the Sophomores filled the till by collecting class dues.





The first few days for the freshmen were spent in orientation and taking tests. The orientation period helped acquaint the neophytes with not only the building but also the teachers, other classmates and courses.






